Hearts Five Times Winners : One Victory for Dunfermline

HEARTS have won the Scottish Cup five times whereas Dunfermline Athletic have only once accomplished the feat. We should appreciate, however, that the Edinburgh club have had many more opportunities to achieve cup success. Hearts one of the oldest British football clubs, were founded in 1873 and are one of the original member clubs of the Scottish Football League and they were Scottish League Champions long before Dunfermline were ever thought of, and they won the Scottish Cup for the first time (in 1891) sixteen years before Dunfermline Athletic came into existance in 1907.

Hearts' other successes in the National Cup Competition were in 1896, 1901, 1906 and 1956 and that last success 12 years ago, coming as it did after half a century's failure in the competition, was responsible for tremendous enthusiasm not only in Edinburgh and the East of Scotland, but all over the country where Hearts have admirers.

Hearts had a great run in the 1956 tournament, including a 4-0 victory over Rangers at Tynecastle and they met Celtic, the other member of the "Old Firm", in the final and beat them

The only member of the Hearts' team actively connected with the club these days is John Cumming, now Hearts' Trainer.

REPUTATION

Dunfermline took a long time to make their Scottish Cup mark but since they did they have become one of the most highly respected clubs in the competition. They won the trophy in 1961 and in only one year since 1963 have they not reached the last eight at least. They came close to another triumph in 1965 when in the final they twice led Celtic by a goal and were finally defeated 3-2 through a winning goal headed by Celtic's captain, Billy McNeill.

But four years earlier it was Dunfermline's Hampden day of glory. 1961 was the very first year they had reached the final and they beat Celtic 2-0 in a replay after a no-scoring draw. The crowd of 87,000 on the Wednesday night—113,328 had watched the Saturday game—saw Thomson and Dickson score the goals and these teams played:—

Dunfermline Athletic—Connachan; Fraser and Cunningham; Mailer, Miller and Sweeney; Peebles and Smith; Thomson, Dickson and Melrose.

Celtic—Haffey; MacKay and O'Neill; Crerand, McNeill and Clark; Gallagher and Fernie, Hughes, Chalmers and Byrne.

Referee—H. Phillips (Wishaw).

Not one of the Dunfermline eleven remains at East End Park. But George Miller, who took over at centre-half in the 1961 final after after Jackie Williamson had been injured, will oppose his old team today as Hearts' captain. In reply, however, Dunfermline will almost certainly have as their centre-half a former Hearts' defender, Roy Barry. And Willie Duff, Hearts' goalkeeper in the successful cup team of 1961, is in Dunfermline's pool of first team players.

(Of the Dunfermline side who lost the 1965 final, the brothers Willie and Tommy Callaghan, John Lunn and Alec Edwards are still "Pars'" heroes.)

Raold Jensen scored for Hearts in the twelfth minute of the first game at Hampden Park and four minutes afterwards Rankin equalised. Allan, Morton's inside-right, scored the first goal of the replay and the Greenock side led until the 63rd minute when Miller equalised. In the second minute of the second period of extra time Kennedy, Morton's captain, was injured and Gray took his place. Hearts had brought on Moller for Traynor. In almost the same moment as Lister was scoring Dunfermline's winning goal Jensen converted a penalty kick for Hearts and they were in the final by the same score—2-1. The teams in the first Hampden game were:—

Hearts—Cruickshank; Sneddon and Mann; Thomson (E), Thomson (A), and Miller; Jensen (R) and Townsend; Ford; Irvine and Traynor.



SEMI-FINALS

Both Scottish Cup final teams of 1968 won their semi-final ties after a drawn first game (in each case 1-1) and after nearly all of 30 minutes extra time in replays on the same grounds.

Dunfermline were a goal down in each of the games at Tynecastle Park. Wilson headed a goal for St. Johnstone after only four minutes of the first game and Gardner equalised in 53 minutes. In the replay McDonald scored for St. Johnstone in 65 minutes and Paton equalised seven minutes later. St. Johnstone goalkeeper Derek Robertson saved a penalty kick taken by his namesake Hugh in 84 minutes. in the twenty-eighth minute of extra time Lister, who had come on as a substitute for Tom Callaghan just after Paton's goal, shot the deciding goal for Dunfermline. 
