

# **DUNFERMLINE AND ST. JOHNSTONE IN SCOTTISH CUP**

ON the reckoning that experience of playing in the later rounds of the competition is of great value to a club engaged in the semi-final of the Scottish Cup Dunfermline Athletic can be counted as in the final. On the further consideration of form in the league this season Dunfermline and not St. Johnstone will be playing at Hampden Park on April 27.

Nevertheless St. Johnstone, for all their poor Scottish Cup record and their alarming position in the relegation zone of the first division, will pay no attention to their apparent disadvantages. We can be certain that they will be all out to cause surprise.

### BEAT CELTIC

Dunfermline won the Scottish Cup for the first and only time in 1961 when they beat Celtic in the final after a drawn first game. Since then they have been one of the most consistent (in the successful sense) Cup teams in the country.

In only one year since 1963 have they failed to reach the quarter-finals at least in the Scottish Cup. Not only that, they gained a semi-final place in 1964 and in 1966 and they were beaten finalists in 1965.

St. Johnstone, on the other hand, have not only never won the trophy, they have only once reached the semi-final stage. The Perth club have more often than not been knocked out either in the first round or in the second. Since the Scottish Cup restarted after the Second World War they have only once got to the last eight. That was in 1966 when they lost 1–0 to Rangers at Ibrox Stadium.

But this season St. Johnstone have also reached the League Cup semi-finals (they lost 3–1 to Dundee at Tannadice Park.)

The first time Dunfermline reached the final they won the trophy. They defeated Celtic 2–0 in a replay after the first game in 1961 had been drawn 0–0. The goals were scored by Thomson and Dickson and the teams were:—

**Dunfermline Athletic**—Connachan; Fraser and Cunningham; Mailer, Miller and Sweeney; Peebles and Smith, Thomson, Dickson and Melrose.

Celtic—Haffey; Mackay and O'Neill; Crerand, McNeill and Clark; Gallagher and Fernie, Hughes, Chalmers and Byrne.

### ILLNESS

Dunfermline had made several changes, George Miller moved to centre-half for the injured Jackie Williamson; Dickson was switched to inside-left and Thomson brought in at centre-forward. Celtic had made one change—Willie O'Neill for Jim Kennedy, who had become ill with appendicitis on the eve of the replay. Curiously Dunfermline had to do without their regular outside-right Tommy McDonald in both games, the winger having been taken suddenly ill just before the first game with the same trouble as was to cause Kennedy's absence in the second game.

Jock Stein had been Dunfermline's manager when they won the Cup. But when they played Celtic in the 1965 final Mr. Stein was the Celtic boss





### IN THE LEAGUE



Twice Dunfermline led—through Harry Melrose and John McLaughlin—and twice Bertie Auld equalised. Then in a tremendous finish Billy McNeill, Celtic's captain, rose above the Dunfermline defenders and scored what was to be the decisive goal.

### THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO

The year in which St. Johnstone gained a semi-final place—and in so doing created a club record—was 1934. Their manager then was Tommy Muirhead, a former Rangers and Scottish Internationalist wing half or insideforward. The records say that Saint's goal-keeper Wylie erred in judgment when he knuckled a corner kick only nine minutes from the end of the Hampden semi-final with Rangers straight to Marshall, who scored the only goal of the match. The teams were:—

## Did you know?



The T pattern football was first produced in 1921. Previous to that date footballs were made in a variety of patterns but all suffered from the fault that they did not remain truly spherical for very long.

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In Saints' next best run in the Scottish Cup, in season 1965-66, they also lost 1–0 to Rangers. That was on March 5, 1966, when Alec Willoughby scored in 72 minutes of the quarter-final tie at Ibrox. The teams that day were:—

### PREVIOUS MEETING

Eight years ago when St. Johnstone were in the second division of the Scottish League they met Dunfermline in the first round of the Scottish Cup. They drew 1–1 at East End Park, Benzie scoring in the first half for Dunfermline and Liddell equalising eight minutes from time. At Muirton Park in the replay Saints, disorganised through an injury to their centre half, Ron McKinven, who was off for 13 minutes of the first half, lost by 4–1. Saints led by a Haughey goal at halftime, but Dunfermline scored through Dickson, Smith, Miller and Benvie. The teams were:—
